“Liberty Street: Alive at Ground Zero” examines the impromptu community of rescue and construction workers, police, federal agents, journalists and, most of all, the disenfranchised residents and business owners in the immediate area of New York’s World Trade Center. This community lasted for about two and a half years following the disaster of 9/11/2001, and dissipated when the cleanup of the site was finally concluded.

“Liberty Street: Alive at Ground Zero” received a “Best of Fest” award at the Putnam County, NY Film and Video Festival, and will be the basis of a forthcoming book, to be published by the University Press of New England in 2006. Mr. Josyph will introduce the film and take part in a question and answer session afterward.
