 The religious and ethical issues created by modern science and technology.

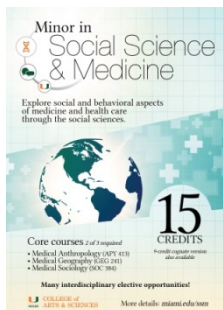
REL 360, **Religion and Bioethics**, Tu/Th 3:30-4:45, Catherine Newell (writing)
